The Library Ramp

- ① On Saturday, Maya volunteered at the library's book sale. Near the entrance, she saw a tall box blocking the ramp. A man using a wheelchair paused at the bottom and looked toward the crowded room. Maya wanted to help, but she worried that moving the box might mix up the sale books and slow the workers.
- ② She found Mr. Ortiz, the sale leader, and explained the problem. He asked two volunteers to hold the box while Maya carried books to an empty table. Together, they cleared the ramp in less than a minute. The man thanked them and rolled inside. Maya noticed that the books were still sorted by price on the table.
- ③ At first, Maya had thought helping would cause a bigger mess. Instead, asking before acting gave everyone a simple plan. She returned to the checkout table feeling calmer. Maya learned that a small, careful action can make a shared space more welcoming for all people who need a clear path without creating a new problem.
