The Windy Sketchbook

- ① On Saturday morning, I arrived at the Riverside Market with my grandfather and my sketchbook tucked under my arm. I am Lena Ortiz, and I had promised to draw the old clock tower for my art class. The market was already busy, with vendors arranging peaches and musicians testing their instruments. Grandfather stopped to buy bread while I sat on the fountain wall, choosing a spot where I could see the tower's copper roof clearly.
- ② After I finished the outline, a gust of wind lifted the top page of my sketchbook. I grabbed for it, but the page skidded across the wet pavement and slipped beneath a vegetable stand. First, I asked the vendor if I could look underneath. Then Grandfather held the stand's striped cloth aside while I crawled carefully along the ground. My knees got damp, and the smell of basil filled the narrow space, but I spotted the page beside a crate of carrots.
- ③ I slid the page back into my sketchbook and checked the drawing. A gray smear crossed one corner, yet the clock tower was still easy to recognize. Because the market bell would ring at noon, I hurried back to the fountain and added the last lines before Grandfather returned with the bread. When the bell sounded, I showed him my finished sketch. He smiled, and I decided the smudge made the drawing look like a cloud drifting past the roof.
