Maya's Garden Investigation

- ① On Monday morning, Maya unlocked the gate to the school garden before the first bell. Dew covered the bean leaves, and a robin hopped along the path. First, she checked the rain gauge beside the shed. After recording half an inch of rain, she carried a watering can to the tomato beds. While she worked near the fence, her science teacher called from the courtyard. A few minutes later, she crossed the courtyard with the gauge. Mr. Lee said the class was starting an experiment.
- ② In the classroom, Mr. Lee placed the gauge beside a lamp and asked the students to predict what would happen to the collected water. Next, Maya poured the water into a clear jar. Earlier that morning, rain had fallen during a cool shower, so the water in the jar was cooler than the room air. By noon, the lamp had warmed the jar, and some water had changed into vapor. Meanwhile, students at another table measured soil from the garden. When the bell rang, Maya labeled the jar and set it on a windowsill.
- ③ The next afternoon, Maya returned to the garden with the jar. At the compost bins, she compared the damp soil with soil that had been kept in a tray indoors. The garden sample formed a ball in her hand, whereas the indoor sample crumbled quickly. Later, back in the science room, she shared her notes with Mr. Lee. As she explained the results, Maya realized that the rain, sunlight, and soil moisture were connected. After school, she placed the jar near the window for one more day of observation.
