Maya's Digital Field Guide

- ① When Maya's class began a digital field guide to city birds, Maya chose the red-tailed hawk. She opened a shared document and typed a short introduction from notes she had taken at the library. Before adding facts from websites, she checked the author, date, and organization behind each source. She saved links in a source list. Her first draft explained where hawks live, what they eat, and why people may spot one on a telephone pole or tall tree.
- ② Next, Maya used the document's comment tool to ask Leo whether her habitat paragraph was clear. Leo suggested a heading and pointed out that one sentence needed a source. Maya replied, added the source, and thanked him. She also invited Noor to check the spelling of scientific names. Their teacher could see the revision history, so each writer's changes were easy to review. The group agreed to use comments for questions and to make edits only after explaining their reasons.
- ③ To prepare for a longer article, Maya planned one sitting with a charged device, a quiet place, and a timer. She practiced placing her fingers on the home row and looking at the screen more than the keys. During the sitting, she typed three full pages, pausing only to stretch and check her outline. After revising, the group published the guide on the school website. Maya reread the online page, tested its links, and responded politely to a classmate's question about hawk nests.
