A Garden by the Bus Loop

- ① Our school should replace one section of lawn near the bus loop with a native-plant garden. The lawn is mowed often, yet it offers little shade or food for local wildlife. Native plants are species that grow naturally in a region and often need less supplemental watering after they become established. A small garden would turn an ordinary space into a useful outdoor area without taking away the field used for games during recess or practice.
- ② First, a native-plant garden could support pollinators such as bees and butterflies. Pollinators move pollen between flowers, helping many plants make seeds and fruit. The U.S. Department of Agriculture explains that native plants provide food and shelter for local pollinators. Because the garden would contain several kinds of flowering plants, it could offer nectar from spring into fall. This reason matters because pollinators help maintain healthy plant communities in parks, yards, and nearby natural areas.
- ③ Second, the garden would give science classes a nearby place to collect observations. Students could compare insect visits, measure plant growth, and record changes across seasons. According to the National Wildlife Federation, school gardens can support hands-on learning by connecting lessons to living things. A garden beside the building would be easier to visit than a distant nature center, so teachers could use it during a single class period. These practical learning opportunities strengthen the case for changing the lawn.
