Why Cities Feel Hotter

- ① On a sunny day, a city block can feel much hotter than a nearby park. This difference is called the urban heat island effect. Dark roofs and paved streets absorb sunlight, then release stored heat slowly. Buildings can also block breezes that would carry warm air away. Because many people, cars, and air conditioners add heat, temperatures in crowded neighborhoods may stay higher after sunset. The effect can make hot weather more dangerous, especially for people without cool places to rest.
- ② Cities can reduce this extra heat by changing surfaces and adding plants. A cool roof is painted or covered with material that reflects more sunlight than a dark roof. Trees shade sidewalks and cool the air as water evaporates from their leaves. In Los Angeles, the city has tested light-colored pavement coatings on some streets. These choices do not stop heat waves, but they can lower surface temperatures and make outdoor spaces safer. They may also reduce the electricity needed for air conditioning.
- ③ Choosing where to place these improvements requires careful planning. City workers can use temperature maps to find blocks that are hotter than nearby areas. They can compare those maps with information about tree cover, bus stops, homes, and schools. A neighborhood with few trees and many people waiting for buses may need shade first. Residents should also help identify places where heat affects daily life. By using evidence instead of guessing, a city can spend limited money on projects that protect more people.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)

Installing shade sails over the school's blacktop would make recess safer during hot weather. The fabric would block direct sunlight above the play area, so students would have a cooler place to line up or rest. Posts could hold the sails high enough for air to move underneath. Benches placed in the shade would give students a place to sit, and a nearby water fountain would help them replace fluids. By focusing on the busiest part of the blacktop, the school could protect many students each day.
