Why City Trees Matter

- ① City trees do more than make streets look green. Their leaves and branches form a canopy, a layer of plant cover above the ground. On hot days, that canopy blocks some sunlight from pavement and buildings. Pavement absorbs solar energy and can become much hotter than shaded ground. Trees also release water vapor through their leaves, a process called transpiration. As the water changes from liquid to vapor, it uses heat energy, which can help cool the air nearby.
- ② Shade can change a person's experience on a sidewalk. A row of mature trees may shade a bus stop, a playground, or the south side of a building during part of the day. In one city block, shade is not spread evenly: a young tree with a small crown covers far less ground than an older tree with wide branches. For this reason, planners consider where a tree will grow, not only where it is planted. They may choose species that fit beneath power lines or tolerate compacted soil beside a curb.
- ③ Trees need care if they are going to provide these benefits for many years. Newly planted trees often need regular watering because their roots have not yet spread widely through the soil. A mulch ring, a layer of material such as wood chips placed around a tree's base, can help soil hold moisture. However, mulch should not touch the trunk, because trapped moisture can harm bark. By planting suitable trees and caring for them, communities can build cooler, more comfortable outdoor spaces.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)

School composting can turn cafeteria scraps into a useful material instead of sending them to a landfill. Compost is decayed organic material that can improve soil. Students can place fruit peels, vegetable scraps, and coffee grounds in labeled collection bins. Workers should not add plastic wrappers or metal utensils because those materials do not break down into compost. After the material decomposes, the school can use it in garden beds to help soil hold water and provide nutrients for plants.
