Why City Trees Matter

- ① On a hot summer afternoon, a row of trees can make a city block feel noticeably cooler. Tree leaves block sunlight from pavement and buildings, while water released from leaves cools the air. This shade can lower the need for air conditioning in nearby homes. Trees also catch some rain before it reaches streets. Their roots help water soak into soil, which can reduce puddles and flooding after heavy storms. For crowded neighborhoods, these benefits make trees more than decoration.
- ② However, planting a tree is only the first step. Young trees need water, mulch, and protection from damage while their roots grow. City planners must choose species that can handle local weather, limited soil, and pests. A tree placed beneath power lines may require frequent trimming, and a tree planted in a tiny sidewalk cutout may struggle to survive. Communities can help by caring for newly planted trees and reporting problems. Planning and maintenance allow the trees' benefits to last for decades.
- ③ Because trees cool streets, manage rainwater, and improve neighborhood spaces, cities have strong reasons to protect and expand their tree cover. The work requires steady care, not just a single planting day. When residents, planners, and local groups share that responsibility, trees can remain healthy long enough to serve future neighbors. Investing in trees is therefore a practical way to make urban areas safer and more comfortable as temperatures rise and storms become more intense.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)
