The Delayed Showcase

- ① At 6:40 on Friday evening, I rolled my bike toward the community center, carrying a shoebox with my robot inside. Rain tapped on my helmet, and the cardboard grew soft against my gloves. The regional robotics showcase started at seven, and I had spent three weeks teaching my robot to sort colored blocks. When I reached the entrance, a volunteer pointed to a sign that said, "Power out. Event delayed." My stomach tightened as the lights blinked overhead.
- ② Inside, teams crowded near the windows, holding projects like precious parcels. I set my shoebox on a table and checked the batteries. They were full, but my robot needed the center's bright floor tape to recognize its path. Then Mateo, a competitor from my school, opened his flashlight app. "We can make a path ourselves," he said. We taped strips of blue paper across the dim floor while rain drummed harder on the roof. Slowly, my hands stopped shaking.
- ③ After twenty minutes, the electricity returned with a click, and the room filled with cheers. The judges decided to continue the showcase, beginning with teams that had waited longest. When my turn came, Mateo held his phone light beside the course, even though the ceiling lamps were on. My robot bumped the first paper strip, paused, and then pushed a red block into the correct bin. I laughed so loudly that a judge laughed too. On the ride home, the wet streets shone like mirrors, and my soggy shoebox felt lighter than air.

#	QUESTION	ANSWER
1	What problem begins the narrative, and how does it affect the narrator's plan for the showcase?	A power outage delays the showcase. The narrator's robot needs bright floor tape to recognize its path, so the outage makes the planned demonstration difficult.
2	What action changes the situation in the second paragraph? Explain how it moves the events forward.	Mateo suggests making a path with his flashlight, and the students tape blue paper strips across the floor. This gives the robot a path and lets the narrator continue preparing.
3	Copy one sensory detail from the passage. What mood or feeling does that detail create?	"Rain drummed harder on the roof" creates a tense, uneasy mood during the delay.
4	How does the final paragraph show that the narrator has changed? Use two details from the passage.	The narrator changes from nervous to relieved and happy. Earlier, the narrator's hands shake, but later the narrator laughs loudly and feels that the soggy shoebox is lighter than air.

On Saturday morning, I carried my poster to the bus stop for the science fair. The air smelled like wet leaves, and cold drops slid down my sleeves.
