A Garden Article Goes Online

- ① For our class website, I wrote a short article about choosing native plants for the school garden. Before drafting, I opened the National Wildlife Federation page “Native Plant Finder” and searched our ZIP code. The site listed plants that support local butterflies and birds. In my article, I linked the words Native Plant Finder to that page. At the end, I added a source note: National Wildlife Federation, “Native Plant Finder,” accessed May 8, 2026, nwf.org/NativePlantFinder.
- ② Next, Maya and I used comments in our shared document to revise the draft together. Maya wrote, “Can we explain why native plants help wildlife?” I replied with a sentence about caterpillars needing certain host plants, then added a second link to the National Audubon Society’s native plants guide. We used Suggesting mode so each change showed up before publishing. After we agreed on the wording, we accepted the changes and posted the article to the class website.
- ③ Publishing did not end our work. On the website, we added a comment box and invited classmates to ask questions or suggest plants. Jordan suggested including plants that bloom in different seasons. We thanked Jordan, checked the idea against the garden plan, and added a chart with spring, summer, and fall choices. We also kept a list of our two sources so readers could open the links and see where our information came from. Clear links, source notes, and respectful comments helped readers trust and improve our writing.
