A Cafeteria Waste Plan

- ① During a two-week waste audit, the Green Team examined trash from the cafeteria after lunch. Students sorted the material into recycling, compost, and landfill categories while adults recorded the results. The audit showed that many unopened milk cartons and whole pieces of fruit were placed in landfill bins. These findings do not prove that students intended to waste food. However, they indicate that the cafeteria should study when and why edible items are discarded each day.
- ② To reduce this waste, the school could begin with a clearly labeled share table. At such a table, students may place unopened, approved foods for other students to take during the same lunch period. This procedure would require guidance from the district nutrition office because food-safety rules vary. For example, items that need refrigeration cannot remain at room temperature for an extended time. A pilot program, followed by careful measurement, would help the school determine whether the table reduces landfill waste without creating new concerns.
- ③ Food recovery offers another option for items that are safe but unlikely to be eaten at school. Federal law generally protects good-faith donors who give apparently wholesome food to nonprofit organizations, although local partners must follow safety requirements. As a result, the school could ask a food bank whether it can accept eligible unopened products. In addition, students can use audit data to create signs that explain correct bin choices. A responsible plan should combine prevention, measurement, and cooperation with qualified community partners.

To improve hallway recycling, the school should place clearly labeled bins near the science classrooms. The labels could show examples of accepted paper and plastic materials. In addition, student volunteers may check the bins each week and report common sorting errors. This plan would provide useful information while reducing recyclable waste in landfill containers.
