Morning Practice

- ① At 6:10 a.m., Maya stepped from the bus into the harbor fog. The dock boards sweated beneath her sneakers, and the air carried a sharp mix of salt and diesel. Her team's narrow rowing shell rested on slings beside the water, its yellow hull beaded with drops. Coach Imani tapped the launch checklist against her clipboard. When Maya lifted her end, the boat flexed lightly, and cold water dripped from the riggers onto her wrist as they carried it down the ramp.
- ② On the water, Maya slid her oar blade through the black surface and felt it catch. The shell surged forward, then shivered as a ferry wake rolled beneath it. "Ready," Coach Imani called from the launch boat. At the start signal, Maya drove her legs, swung her back, and pulled the handle to her ribs. Oarlocks clicked in a steady pattern. Spray snapped against her cheeks, while the rising sun broke the fog into pale ribbons behind the bridge.
- ③ Halfway through the practice, a gust shoved the shell toward a line of orange buoys. Maya heard the wind slap the flag above the boathouse and saw the nearest buoy bob closer. She feathered her oar, dipped one blade, and pressed gently until the bow turned away. Her breathing slowed as the boat straightened. "Nice correction," Coach Imani said. Maya tasted salt on her lip and tightened her grip for the final stretch, where each stroke sent a silver fan of water behind her.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)
