Trees as Heat Protection

- ① On summer afternoons, neighborhoods with fewer trees can become much hotter than nearby parks. Pavement and dark roofs absorb sunlight, then release heat slowly after sunset. Trees reduce this effect in two ways. Their leaves cast shade on sidewalks, buildings, and parked cars. They also release water vapor through transpiration, which can cool the surrounding air. Satellite images often show lower land-surface temperatures in places with more tree cover. Because tree cover is not distributed evenly, residents in some neighborhoods face higher heat exposure than residents only a few blocks away.
- ② Planting trees, however, is not as simple as placing any sapling in an empty strip of grass. Young trees need watering, protection from damage, and enough soil for roots to grow. Cities also must select species that can handle local temperatures, pests, and storms. Some trees can interfere with power lines if they are planted in the wrong location. Programs work best when city planners consult residents about where shade is most needed and when they budget for care after planting. In one planning approach, city staff and residents map hot walking routes near schools, bus stops, and senior centers before choosing planting sites.
- ③ Urban tree planting is therefore more than a beautification project. When communities place and care for trees where heat is greatest, they can make daily travel and outdoor spaces safer during extreme weather. The work can also direct public resources toward neighborhoods that have received less shade in the past. Still, planting alone will not solve every heat-related problem, so cities should combine trees with cooling centers, safe housing, and reliable public transit. A thoughtful tree program shows how a practical local choice can improve health, comfort, and fairness at the same time.

Later start times can help schools support students' health and readiness to learn.
