Solar Canopy Review

- ① To evaluate whether the district should replace one parking lot with a solar canopy, the facilities committee reviewed electricity records from 2023 and 2024. The school used an average of 1.8 million kilowatt-hours each year. A canopy would not eliminate this demand, but an engineering estimate indicates that it could supply about 320,000 kilowatt-hours annually. Therefore, the committee recommends studying the project’s cost and structural requirements before approving construction for campus use.
- ② Supporters may argue that the canopy would visibly demonstrate the district’s environmental goals. That benefit is relevant, yet it does not by itself establish financial value. The committee should compare the estimated energy production with installation, maintenance, and financing costs. It should also examine shading effects, drainage, and access for emergency vehicles. These criteria allow decision makers to assess the proposal using measurable evidence rather than personal preference or public opinion.
- ③ Some residents have described solar power as an obvious solution to rising utility bills. This wording overstates what the available information shows. Utility savings depend on panel output, electricity rates, weather, and the terms of any financing agreement. A formal report should state these limits directly. For example, the committee can conclude that the canopy may reduce purchased electricity, while noting that a final recommendation requires verified bids and a site-specific engineering review.

The survey suggests that Saturday library hours may meet student demand, since 68 percent of respondents favored the change. Before approving the schedule, the board should compare the projected \$4,800 semester staffing cost with expected attendance, because the survey does not show how often students would use the library.
