### Designing a Safer Poster

- ① When Maya volunteered to write a poster for the county library's eclipse program, she first listed her purpose: help families observe safely and arrive prepared. Her first draft explained the Sun, Moon, and Earth in detail, then ended with one sentence about eye protection. During planning, she realized that parents scanning a poster needed the safety rule before background information. She also noticed that the event time and location were buried in a long paragraph. Maya decided her strongest ideas were the viewing rule, the schedule, and a clear invitation to attend.
- ② She rewrote the opening as, "Use eclipse glasses that meet the ISO 12312-2 standard. Ordinary sunglasses do not protect your eyes." She placed the program details in a short line beneath it: "Saturday, April 12, 1:30 p.m., River Branch Library." Maya cut a comparison between lunar and solar eclipses because it did not help families make a safe plan. To make the poster easy to scan, she changed dense sentences into headings and bullets. She kept one brief explanation, stating that a solar eclipse occurs when the Moon passes between Earth and the Sun. Then she asked the librarian whether the tone sounded calm rather than alarming.
- ③ The librarian suggested one final change: replace "Failure to use approved filters can cause retinal injury" with "Protect your eyes, use eclipse glasses." Maya accepted the revision because families needed an immediate action, not medical vocabulary. During editing, she checked capitalization, punctuation, and the time format. She also verified the safety guidance with NASA's eclipse resources before printing. Maya did not add every fact she had researched. Instead, she used the available space for information that served the poster's purpose. Her final version gave readers a safe action, a place, a time, and just enough science to explain the event.
