SUPPORTS THE CLAIM

A supporting statement gives a reason or evidence that backs up a claim. It helps show why the claim may be a good idea.

Claim: The city should plant more trees. Support: Trees provide shade on hot days.

OPPOSES THE CLAIM

An opposing statement gives a different position or a reason not to accept a claim. It points out a concern, drawback, or alternate choice.

Claim: The city should plant more trees. Opposes: The city should repair damaged sidewalks first.

PART 3 • MAKE YOUR OWN (SAMPLE ANSWERS)

- **SUPPORTS:** Students could use extra morning time to eat breakfast before class.
- **OPPOSES:** A later dismissal could make it harder for some students to attend evening jobs.

Challenge: Our school should start at 8:30 a.m. First, many teenagers need more sleep to stay alert in class. Research also links later school starts with more sleep for teenagers. Some students may need time for after-school jobs, but a later start would still help students arrive ready to learn.

For Part 2, students should correctly identify one supporting statement and one opposing statement, then explain each statement's role. For the challenge, check for a clear claim, two logically ordered supports, and an acknowledged opposing claim.
