Cooling a Hot City

- ① On a hot day, pavement can make a neighborhood feel even warmer. Dark surfaces absorb sunlight and release heat slowly. As a result, cities often stay warmer than nearby rural areas after sunset. This pattern is called the urban heat island effect. However, heat is not spread evenly across a city. Blocks with few trees, wide roads, and many parking lots can become especially hot. Residents in those areas may face higher cooling costs and greater health risks during heat waves.
- ② Trees can lower street temperatures in more than one way. First, their leaves provide shade, so less sunlight reaches sidewalks and roofs. In addition, water evaporates from leaves, a process that cools the surrounding air. Because mature trees need years to grow, planting them is not a quick fix. Still, city planners can pair new trees with other actions, such as using lighter roof materials and creating shaded bus stops. Together, these steps can make outdoor spaces safer during very hot weather.
- ③ Some cities are testing cool pavements, which reflect more sunlight than traditional dark pavement. For example, Los Angeles has applied light-colored coating to selected streets. The coating can reduce surface temperature, but it does not solve every heat problem. For instance, pedestrians still need shade and access to drinking water. Therefore, cool pavement works best as one part of a larger plan. When cities combine reflective surfaces, trees, and public cooling centers, they can protect more people from dangerous heat.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)

First, our school could place a shade sail over the blacktop near the basketball hoops after lunch. Because the sail would block direct sunlight, students could wait for rides in a cooler space. In addition, the school could add a water fountain nearby so students can refill bottles during afternoon activities. However, a sail cannot cool every part of the campus. Therefore, teachers could also schedule outdoor activities earlier on very hot days. Together, these changes would reduce heat exposure while keeping recess, after-school events, and pickup time available for more students.
