A Calmer Lunch Choice

- ① Our school should create a quiet, device-free area in the cafeteria during lunch. Many students want a place to read, finish homework, or talk without constant videos and game sounds. The regular cafeteria can remain social and lively, but one section with clear expectations would serve students who need a calmer choice. This change would not require new rooms or expensive equipment. Staff could use a few existing tables near the library doors and post a simple sign explaining that phones stay silent and stored away.
- ② Some people may argue that a device-free area would be difficult to enforce. However, the goal is not to punish students or ban phones from the whole cafeteria. Students could choose whether to sit there, and classmates who prefer music or games could use other tables. A voluntary area is likely to work because students already select lunch spaces based on friends, noise, and activities. It could also help students who feel overwhelmed by crowded, noisy settings. By offering two kinds of spaces, the school would respect different needs instead of treating one lunch experience as best for everyone.
- ③ Creating a quiet, device-free lunch area is a practical way to make the cafeteria more useful to more students. It builds on the school's existing tables, preserves other spaces for social activity, and gives students a choice about their lunch environment. Rather than limiting everyone's behavior, the plan adds an option for students seeking focus or calm. The school should test the area for one month, ask students and staff for feedback, and adjust the location if needed. A small trial can show whether this simple change makes lunch more welcoming without disrupting the cafeteria's usual energy.
