Should High Schools Start Later?

- ① Many high schools begin before 8:00 a.m., even though teenagers' biological clocks shift later during puberty. This shift can make it difficult for students to fall asleep early enough to get the eight to ten hours of sleep recommended for teens. In 2014, the American Academy of Pediatrics advised middle and high schools to aim for start times of 8:30 a.m. or later. Changing a schedule, however, affects buses, sports, family routines, and after-school jobs. A useful explanation of later start times must consider both the health evidence and the practical challenges.
- ② Research has linked later start times with longer sleep and better attendance, although results can vary by community. When Seattle moved public high school start times nearly an hour later in 2016, researchers reported that students slept about 34 minutes more on school nights. The study found improved grades and reported better attendance at one of the schools examined, but it could not prove that the schedule change alone caused every improvement. District leaders still need to plan transportation carefully, especially when the same buses serve several schools. They also need to ask students and families how a new timetable could change work, caregiving, or athletic commitments.
- ③ Later high school start times are not a simple cure for tired students, because sleep also depends on homework, jobs, stress, and personal habits. Yet the evidence on teen biology and the Seattle study suggests that schedules can remove one barrier to adequate rest. Schools should therefore examine whether a later start is workable in their own communities, rather than treating an early bell as unavoidable. If leaders coordinate transportation and listen to families, a schedule change can support learning without ignoring local needs. The larger lesson is that school policies can shape students' daily ability to learn, so practical decisions deserve careful attention to health evidence.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)

The 30 percent decrease in lunch-period referrals and the reports from 56 of 80 students suggest that phone-free tables can improve the lunch environment. School leaders should consider expanding the pilot while gathering more feedback, because a calmer, more connected lunch period may support students beyond the cafeteria.

Accept conclusions that accurately connect both pilot details to a reasonable recommendation or implication. The recommendation should follow from the evidence and should not claim that the pilot proves results for every student.
