The Triangle Fire and Its Legacy

- ① On March 25, 1911, a fire broke out at the Triangle Shirtwaist Factory in New York City's Asch Building. The factory occupied the eighth, ninth, and tenth floors, where many young immigrant workers made blouses. Flames spread quickly through fabric scraps and wooden worktables. Some workers could not escape because one exit door was locked, while another stairway soon filled with smoke and fire. Firefighters' ladders did not reach the highest floors. In less than half an hour, 146 people died, many after jumping from windows.
- ② Public anger turned the disaster into a political issue. Frances Perkins, who later became the first woman to serve in a U.S. presidential cabinet, watched the fire from the street and described it as a formative event. Labor advocates used the tragedy to argue that workplace safety could not depend solely on an employer's choices. New York created the Factory Investigating Commission, which inspected workplaces and proposed reforms. Over the next several years, the state passed laws addressing fire exits, building safety, hours, and working conditions. These measures influenced labor protections beyond New York.
- ③ The trial of factory owners Max Blanck and Isaac Harris showed another difficulty. A jury acquitted them of manslaughter in 1911 after prosecutors failed to prove that the owners knew the exit door was locked. The verdict frustrated many observers, but the fire's importance did not rest on the trial alone. It became a symbol used by reformers, unions, and journalists to connect individual deaths with broader workplace conditions. Remembering the disaster requires more than recounting its horror, it also means tracing how public pressure helped change laws and expectations.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)

The criminal case against the Triangle owners ended without convictions because their knowledge of the locked door was not established. Yet the disaster had consequences beyond court. Activists and news writers treated it as evidence that dangerous working conditions demanded public action, leading people to expect stronger protections.
