Prairie Plot Field Report

- ① At 6:15 a.m., the restoration crew reached the prairie plot behind the city library. Overnight rain had darkened the soil, but the milkweed seedlings stood upright among the grasses. Lena checked each plant's tag, recording height, leaf damage, and signs of aphids in a weatherproof notebook. Her partner, Omar, photographed the eastern edge of the plot; its drainage ditch had overflowed during the storm. Before the group began weeding, the site manager reviewed one rule: remove invasive garlic mustard, but leave native goldenrod and asters untouched.
- ② By 8:00, volunteers had filled three bags with garlic mustard. The work required patience: seedlings of the invasive plant sometimes resembled young native species. To avoid mistakes, the crew compared leaf shapes with a laminated guide and asked questions before pulling anything. Omar's photographs, however, revealed a second concern: runoff from the street had carried bits of plastic into the ditch. The volunteers divided the next tasks clearly: two people collected litter, three inspected the water's edge, and Lena updated the plot map on the clipboard before lunch.
- ③ At noon, the manager sent the day's observations to the parks department, which tracks restoration sites across the county. She noted that the plot's drainage problem could affect newly planted roots; she also requested a barrier near the ditch. The report included precise details, not guesses, because future crews would use it to plan their work. As the volunteers packed their tools, a monarch butterfly crossed the clearing and landed on a milkweed leaf. No one claimed the project was finished, yet everyone could see evidence of the prairie's recovery.

3	In paragraph 2, what word is set off by commas in "Omar's photographs, however, revealed ..."? What relationship does that word signal?	"However." It signals a contrast between the earlier successful work and the newly discovered concern.
4	What does the apostrophe in "day's observations" in paragraph 3 show?	It shows that the observations belong to one day.

At the river cleanup, our team's checklist named three priorities: gloves, sorting bins, and a first-aid kit. Maya counted the full trash bags; the coordinator recorded their total. The group's report described the work clearly.
