- ② Near a mossy log, she sees ants march by. They carry crumbs in a busy line as they go. A squirrel flicks its tail nearby. Then it digs a small hole below.
- ③ At sunset, Mia rests on a smooth stone. She watches the clouds turn gold and red. The bird flies home to its nest alone. Mia smiles, then heads home to bed.

1	What is the rhyme scheme in the first stanza?	AABB
2	What is the rhyme scheme in the second stanza?	ABAB
3	How is the rhyme scheme in the third stanza different from the first stanza?	The third stanza is ABAB, while the first stanza is AABB.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)

1. I see a rabbit near a tree. (A) 2. It hops across the grass with glee. (A) 3. A turtle crawls beside a log. (B) 4. It rests near a sleepy frog. (B)
