The Missing Kite

- ③ Finally, Mia gently took the string and checked the kite for tears. One corner was bent, so she smoothed it with her hand. Scout wagged his tail, and Mia laughed. "Thank you for finding it," she told him. Soon, the clouds drifted away, and Mia flew the kite again. She walked home smiling, with Scout trotting beside her and the red kite dancing safely overhead.
