The Monarch Journey

- ① Every autumn, monarch butterflies begin a long migration. Some travel from Canada and the United States to mountain forests in central Mexico. A single butterfly cannot complete the full trip and return. Instead, several generations continue the journey. Monarchs have bright orange wings with black lines. Their colorful pattern can warn birds that the butterfly may taste bad.
- ② During migration, monarchs use the sun as a guide. They fly when the temperature is warm enough. At night, thousands may rest together on the same tree. This gathering gives them some protection from wind and rain. The butterflies do not make the whole trip in one day. They pause to drink nectar from flowers.
- ③ In spring, the surviving monarchs fly north and lay eggs on milkweed plants. A caterpillar hatches from each egg and eats milkweed leaves. Later, the caterpillar forms a chrysalis. Inside it, the insect changes into a butterfly. This remarkable change is called metamorphosis. New butterflies continue north, and the migration begins again for another season.
