YOUR JOB Number the four poem cards 1 through 4. Circle the line, sound, or pattern clues that help you name each kind of poem.

Library Window Cards

- ① At the town library, four poem cards hung beside a window. The first card had three short lines: "Red kite in blue sky / Wind pulls its tail up higher / Clouds drift slowly by." Maya noticed the lines were arranged in a small pattern. She tapped her fingers and counted five syllables in the first line, seven in the next, and five in the last.
- ② The second card held this silly five-line story: "A baker walked out in the snow / His round dough began to go / It rolled past a cat / Then bumped on a hat / And stopped at a bright puppet show." Maya saw that lines one, two, and five ended with sounds alike. The shorter middle lines also had matching ending sounds.
- ③ The third card used lines of different lengths: "Turtle on warm sand / under a leaf / toward the pond." The ending words did not make a sound pattern. The last card read, "Fireflies glow at night / Stars shine with soft light / Waves curl by a tree / Boats rock on the sea." Luis read both cards aloud and listened closely.

#	QUESTION	ANSWER
1	Which poem type is on the first card? Use its line and syllable pattern to explain.	Haiku. It has three lines with 5, 7, and 5 syllables.
2	Which poem type is on the second card? Use the number of lines and the ending sounds to explain.	Limerick. It has five lines, with lines 1, 2, and 5 rhyming and lines 3 and 4 rhyming.
3	Which poem type is on the third card? What clues helped you identify it?	Free verse. Its lines have different lengths and no planned end-sound pattern.
4	Which poem type is on the last card? Name the pairs of matching end sounds that show this.	Rhymed verse. "Night" matches "light," and "tree" matches "sea."

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)

Small fox steps softly Through the tall grass at sunset Moon lights its bright path Type: haiku Fox pauses beside the dark creek. A leaf floats away. Type: free verse

Accept haiku identifications when students cite three lines and the 5-7-5 syllable pattern. Accept limerick for five lines with an AABBA end-sound pattern, free verse for varied lines without planned rhyme, and rhymed verse for matching end sounds.
