Monarch Butterfly Clues

- ① **From Egg to Adult** First, a female monarch butterfly lays a tiny egg on a milkweed leaf. Next, a caterpillar hatches and eats the leaf. After it grows, the caterpillar forms a chrysalis. About two weeks later, an adult butterfly comes out. The adult dries its wings before it flies away to find nectar and, later, lay eggs.
- ② **Monarchs and Viceroy** A monarch butterfly and a viceroy butterfly can look alike. Both have orange wings with black lines. However, a monarch has a black border with white dots, while a viceroy has an extra black line across each back wing. This look-alike pattern may help protect the viceroy, because birds often avoid monarchs, which taste bad.
- ③ **Why Milkweed Matters** Monarch caterpillars need milkweed to eat. When fields and gardens have less milkweed, fewer monarch caterpillars can find food. As a result, fewer caterpillars may survive to become adult butterflies. People can help by planting native milkweed in suitable places. More milkweed gives female monarchs places to lay eggs and gives caterpillars leaves to eat.

1	How do the headings help you find information in the passage?	Each heading tells the topic of its paragraph, helping readers find information about life stages, butterfly differences, or milkweed.
2	What text structure is used in "From Egg to Adult"? Give two words or phrases that support your answer.	Chronology. Answers may include "First," "Next," "After," or "About two weeks later."
3	What text structure is used in "Monarchs and Viceroy"? Give one detail that shows this structure.	Comparison. For example, both butterflies have orange wings with black lines, but the viceroy has an extra black line across each back wing.
4	What text structure is used in "Why Milkweed Matters"? Explain the cause and one effect.	Cause and effect. Less milkweed causes fewer caterpillars to find food, so fewer may survive to become adult butterflies.

The heading "From Egg to Adult" tells readers that the paragraph explains a monarch's life stages. The words "First" and "Next" help readers follow the order of the changes. In "Why Milkweed Matters," "As a result" connects less milkweed to fewer caterpillars surviving.
