A Home for Bats

- ① At sunset, bats fly out to search for food. Many kinds eat insects, including mosquitoes and moths. A single small bat can catch many insects in one night. Bats need quiet places to rest during the day, but old trees and barns are not always available near towns. This can make it harder for bats to find safe shelter.
- ② People can build bat houses to give bats a resting spot. A bat house is a tall, narrow wooden box with small spaces inside. It is placed high on a pole or building where cats cannot reach it. In warm weather, a bat house may hold a group of bats. The bats can then leave at night to hunt insects nearby.
- ③ A bat house needs careful placement. It should receive several hours of sun and be mounted at least 10 feet above the ground. People should avoid disturbing bats by opening the box or touching them. A school or family can learn these steps before safely adding a bat house in an outdoor space at school or home.
