Why Schools Need Gardens

- ① Many schools should have a small garden on campus. A garden can give students a place to learn by doing. Instead of only reading about seeds, roots, and insects, students can observe them outside. A garden does not need a large field. Even a few raised beds or pots near a sunny wall can become an outdoor classroom.
- ② Gardens can also help students practice math and science. In a garden, students can measure a bean plant each week and record its height on a chart. They can count how many ladybugs visit the leaves. Plants need sunlight, water, air, and nutrients to grow, so students can see how living things meet their needs.
- ③ Some people may worry that a school garden takes too much work. However, classes can share simple jobs, such as watering, pulling weeds, and checking plants. A garden can also grow herbs or vegetables for a school meal or tasting lesson. These jobs and harvests give students a reason to care for a shared space.
