She pressed the dark, damp soil into a smooth circle and tucked the tiny seeds inside.
- ② Next, Maya filled a watering can at the outdoor faucet. Its metal handle felt icy against her fingers. As she poured, muddy water splashed onto her sneakers, but she laughed. Then a sharp gust bent the tall grass around the lot. Maya worried that the rain would wash away her seeds, so she covered the circle with a loose layer of leaves.
- ③ By afternoon, the clouds had opened into bright blue patches. Maya returned to the lot with her neighbor, Luis. Finally, they pushed three wooden signs into the ground: "Sunflowers Growing." The signs leaned a little, and their letters looked wobbly, yet Maya smiled. She imagined yellow faces rising above the fence. After that day, she checked the soil each morning before school.
