A Native-Plant Garden

- ① Our school should add a small native-plant garden near the playground. Native plants grow naturally in this area, so they can help local insects and birds. The National Wildlife Federation explains that many butterflies and bees need native plants for food and places to lay eggs. A garden would give students a close-up way to observe these animals during science lessons.
- ② Some people may worry that a garden would cost too much. However, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency says native plants often need less water after they are established than many nonnative garden plants. This could lower the amount of watering the school needs. In addition, the school could begin with a few donated plants and ask families to help mulch and weed on one Saturday.
- ③ Finally, a native-plant garden can make the playground more useful all year. A guide from the U.S. Forest Service notes that native plants support wildlife because animals have adapted to them over time. Students could measure plant growth, sketch pollinators, and write observations. For these reasons, the principal should approve a garden plan and let a student team choose a sunny spot.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)

Our school should add a water bottle filling station in the cafeteria. First, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention says schools can help students drink water by providing access to safe, free water. This station would make it easier for students to refill bottles at lunch. In addition, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency explains that reusable bottles can reduce waste from single-use bottles. Fewer throwaway bottles could keep cafeteria trash cans from filling so quickly. Therefore, the principal should consider adding a filling station.

Accept equivalent wording for the claim, source evidence, and explanations that accurately connect evidence to a reason. For the paragraph, check for a clear claim, evidence from two named sources, elaboration, transitions, and an organized ending.
