Researching City Trees

- ① Jordan wanted to answer the question, "How do city trees help people?" He did not begin by searching for one quick fact. First, he made a plan with three note headings: shade and cooling, cleaner air, and homes for wildlife. These headings helped him collect facts that matched his question. They also kept him from mixing different kinds of information on one page.
- ② At the library, Jordan found a book by a forest scientist. He also used a webpage from the city forestry department. Both sources named their authors or organizations and gave dates. A snack company's advertisement about planting trees had no author and mainly tried to sell food, so Jordan did not use it. He checked whether the book and webpage agreed before writing a note.
- ③ Jordan wrote each note in his own words and placed it under a heading. Under shade and cooling, he noted that tree leaves block some sunlight from reaching sidewalks and buildings. Under homes for wildlife, he recorded that birds can nest in trees. On a source list, he wrote the book title and the webpage address. His organized notes helped him answer his question with information from two sources.

Fact: Beaver dams slow moving water and can form ponds. Source: National Park Service. Heading: Habitat. Fact: Beaver ponds can provide habitat for fish, birds, and other wildlife. Source: Minnesota Department of Natural Resources.
