More Trees for Our Town

- ① Our town should plant more shade trees near sidewalks, bus stops, and playgrounds. Trees make outdoor places safer and more comfortable on hot days. Their leaves block some sunlight, so pavement and play equipment do not heat up as quickly. A shaded bus stop can also give riders a cooler place to wait during summer afternoons.
- ② More trees can also help people breathe cleaner air. Tree leaves catch some tiny particles that blow through the air, including dust and soot. Trees take in carbon dioxide, a gas released when fuels burn, and give off oxygen. One tree cannot clean an entire neighborhood, but many healthy trees can help make the air around busy streets cleaner.
- ③ Finally, trees help towns handle rainstorms. When rain falls on bare pavement, it rushes into drains and can carry litter into streams. Tree roots hold soil in place, and the ground around trees can soak up water. Planting and caring for trees costs money, but the cooler spaces, cleaner air, and better rain control make them a smart choice for our town.
