Saving the Seed Packets

- ① On Saturday morning, I carried a box of seed packets to the community garden. Dark clouds gathered above the fence, and the wind tugged at the labels. “We should cover the beds,” Mr. Chen said. I hurried to the shed for a tarp while he held the box. Just then, the first raindrops tapped my hat.
- ② First, I spread the tarp across the nearest bed, but a gust lifted one corner. “Grab that side!” I called to my friend Nia, who was filling a watering can nearby. She caught the corner, and together we tucked smooth stones along the edges. Next, we moved the seed packets inside the shed before the rain soaked them.
- ③ Finally, the storm passed as quickly as it had arrived. Mr. Chen lifted the tarp and smiled at the dry soil. “Our little garden made it through,” he said. Afterward, Nia and I planted the seeds in neat rows. As sunlight returned, I wrote each plant’s name on a label and felt proud that we had protected the future sprouts.
