A Garden for Our School

- ① Our school should create a small native-plant garden beside the playground. It would make the space more useful than a strip of plain grass. First, native flowers can provide food and shelter for local pollinators, such as bees and butterflies. The U.S. Forest Service explains that native plants support wildlife because they grow naturally in an area. A garden could help students observe these animals safely.
- ② Also, the garden could save water after it is established. According to the Environmental Protection Agency, native plants usually need less water than many nonnative plants because they are suited to local rainfall and soil. Our grounds crew would not need to water the bed as often as a flower bed filled with thirsty plants. This makes the idea practical, not only beautiful.
- ③ Finally, a native-plant garden can be built in stages. The National Wildlife Federation suggests choosing plants that belong in the local region, so a science class could research which flowers fit our area. Then families could donate a few plants, and classes could add more each season. For these reasons, the principal should approve a garden plan for next spring.

4	How do the transitions "First," "Also," and "Finally" help organize the passage?	They introduce three separate reasons in an orderly sequence: helping pollinators, saving water, and building the garden in stages.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)

Our school should install a water-bottle filling station near the cafeteria. First, it could make water easier to choose at lunch. The CDC recommends choosing water instead of sugary drinks. Because the station would be nearby, students could refill bottles before buying a sweet drink. In addition, the EPA recommends reusable items to reduce waste. Students could use the station with reusable bottles instead of bringing single-use drink containers. Therefore, a filling station would support healthier choices and create less trash.
