How a Bean Seed Grows

- ① Today I will explain how a bean seed begins to grow. [Stand tall and look at the audience.] First, a dry seed takes in water from the soil. Water wakes up the tiny plant inside the seed. Say “germination” slowly and clearly. This word means the start of growth. [Pause for two seconds before continuing with the next step.]
- ② Next, the seed coat softens and splits. [Hold two hands together, then open them.] A small root pushes downward. It anchors the new plant and pulls in water. Speak at a steady pace, not too fast. After that, a shoot grows upward toward light. Point upward as you say “shoot” so listeners can follow the change.
- ③ Finally, leaves open above the soil and use sunlight to make food for the plant. [Open your hands like leaves.] Finish with a voice that all listeners can hear, but do not shout. Pronounce “sunlight” and “soil” clearly. [Look around the room.] This final step shows that the seedling can begin making its own food.
