A Bin That Builds Soil

- ① At the school garden, Maya noticed a covered bin labeled "compost." Inside, tiny decomposers, such as bacteria and fungi, were breaking down apple cores and dry leaves. This process changes old food scraps into dark, crumbly material that can enrich soil. Maya learned that the bin needs air, moisture, and a balanced mix of green and brown materials.
- ② During decomposition, microbes use oxygen as they feed. If a pile becomes too wet or tightly packed, it may smell unpleasant because less oxygen reaches the center. Gardeners can aerate the pile by turning it with a fork. They may also add shredded newspaper, which creates spaces for air and helps absorb extra moisture more quickly.
- ③ When compost is ready, it looks nearly like soil and has an earthy smell. It should not contain recognizable chunks of fruit or leaves. Maya spread a thin layer around seedlings, then watered them. The compost improved the soil structure, helping roots receive water and nutrients. By reusing plant waste, the garden reduced the amount of trash sent away.
