Heat Beneath Iceland

- ① Far below Iceland's rocky surface, heat from Earth powers geothermal plants. Workers drill deep wells to reach underground water warmed by nearby magma. The hot water becomes steam that spins turbines, which generate electricity. Afterward, the cooled water is returned underground, where it can be heated again. This renewable system can provide power without burning coal or oil.
- ② Engineers monitor each plant carefully. A sensor can detect unusual pressure inside a pipe before a leak becomes serious. If repairs are needed, technicians inspect the equipment and replace damaged parts. Their work helps prevent shutdowns and keeps the plant operating safely. Communities near geothermal areas may use this steady energy for homes, schools, and businesses.
- ③ Geothermal energy is not available everywhere. Plants work best where heat lies close to the surface, such as near volcanoes or hot springs. Still, scientists are researching methods that could make geothermal power more accessible in other places. By studying rocks, water, and heat, they hope to expand this resource while protecting underground water supplies.
