### Story Walk Surprise

- ① On Saturday morning, Mara unlocked the small library book shed in Maple Park. Rain tapped the metal roof, and puddles filled the path to the soccer field. Mara had promised to set out books for the park's story walk before noon. She loved making lists and keeping plans, so she had packed each book in order inside a red wagon.
- ② At the first bend, one wagon wheel sank into soft mud. The wagon tipped, and a stack of books slid toward a puddle. Mara grabbed the top book, then froze. If she pulled hard, more books might fall. Her cousin Leo, who had arrived to help, suggested carrying the books by hand. Mara frowned because that would take longer, but she saw he was right.
- ③ Mara and Leo carried small stacks beneath the shed roof, then rolled the empty wagon free. Mara changed her plan. Instead of placing books along the muddy path, they hung plastic-covered pages on the fence beside the basketball court. By noon, families could read the story without stepping in water. Mara thanked Leo and added a new note to her list: "Leave room for better ideas."
