### Morning Watch

- ① Before sunrise, Maya climbed the wooden steps of the fire lookout with her grandfather. The valley below was a dark bowl holding sleeping trees. Cold air nipped her cheeks, and the railings wore beads of dew. Grandfather handed Maya binoculars. “We watch for smoke,” he said. “A small wisp can be a warning bell.” Maya scanned the hills as the first light spilled over the ridge.
- ② Then a thin gray line rose beyond Pine Creek. It curled like a question mark above the pines. Maya’s stomach became a tight knot, but she kept looking. The radio crackled, and Grandfather reported the smoke to the ranger station. Soon, an engine growled on the road below. The lookout, quiet all morning, seemed to hold its breath while crews checked the area.
- ③ By noon, the smoke was gone. A cooking fire at a campsite had been put out safely. Maya watched sunlight dance across the creek and felt her fear loosen. Grandfather smiled. “The forest speaks in clues,” he said. “Our job is to listen.” As they climbed down, the valley no longer looked like a dark bowl. It was a wide green map, bright with paths and possibilities.

**PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)**

Storm clouds crowded the beach like a wall, and the wind tugged at Lena’s hat. When the rain stopped, the sun peeked through, and the waves whispered against the shore. Lena’s worry drifted away as the beach turned silver and calm. The phrase “the waves whispered” makes the shore feel gentle, showing that Lena is no longer afraid.

Accept reasonable explanations that connect a figurative phrase to a picture, feeling, mood, or change in meaning. For the open response, check that the student uses a simile, personification, and an explanation of the effect of one phrase.
