The Depot Display Card

- ① For the town history fair, Jada and Luis wrote a display card about the old train depot. Their first draft said, “The depot was important. It was important because many people used it.” Jada liked the clear topic, but Luis wondered whether visitors would know why the depot mattered. They checked a local archive and found that trains carried citrus crates from nearby groves. The pair planned to add this detail, but they first asked two classmates to read the card and share comments.
- ② One reader, Mina, wrote, “The citrus fact helps me understand the depot’s job. Could you tell when the depot opened?” Another reader, Theo, noticed that the draft repeated the word important. He suggested replacing that word with a more exact description. Jada and Luis discussed both comments. They agreed to include the opening year because it would help visitors place the depot in time. They also decided not to mention every fact from the archive, since a display card needs to stay brief and focused.
- ③ After revising, their card began, “Opened in 1908, the depot helped nearby growers send citrus crates by train.” The new sentence gave readers a date and explained the depot’s role. Jada changed the repeated word important to useful, which fit the card’s meaning better. Before printing the card, the pair read it aloud together. Luis caught a missing comma after 1908, and Jada checked the archive note one more time. Their final version was clearer because they used feedback, made choices, and edited carefully.
