How Beavers Shape a Stream

- ① Along streams in North America, beavers build dams from branches, mud, and stones. A dam slows moving water, causing a pond to form behind it. Beavers use the pond as protection because deep water makes it harder for many land predators to reach their lodge. The lodge, often built from sticks and mud, has an underwater entrance. Inside, the animals rest, raise young, and store food for winter. A beaver family may repair its dam whenever water leaks through.
- ② These ponds can change the surrounding habitat. When water spreads into nearby low areas, it may create wetlands with shallow water and muddy edges. Frogs, insects, fish, and water birds can find food or shelter there. Trees near a new pond sometimes die if their roots remain underwater for too long. Even so, the standing dead trees may later provide nesting places for woodpeckers and other birds. By altering water flow, beavers can create homes for many species.
- ③ People do not always welcome beaver activity. A dam can flood a road, a garden, or a field, and beavers may chew trees near homes. In some places, wildlife workers place a pipe through a dam. The pipe lets some water pass while leaving the pond in place. Workers may also wrap wire around valuable tree trunks. These methods can reduce conflicts without removing the animals or destroying the wetland habitat they have created nearby.
