The Library During the Storm

Maya had planned to finish a history project, but the dark computer screen was as useless as a map with no labels. She found the librarian, who was gathering lanterns from a supply closet.
- ② "People will need a dry place to wait," the librarian said. Soon, neighbors arrived with wet coats, crying toddlers, and worried pets. Maya set out chairs while the librarian called the town office. The library's quiet rooms became a small harbor during the storm. No one sailed there, yet people could rest safely until the streets cleared. When a boy asked whether the lights would return, Maya answered, "The repair crews are working. We will know more soon."
- ③ At midnight, the electricity returned with a click, and the computers blinked awake. Cheers bounced from the ceiling like rubber balls. Maya looked through the window. The rain had softened to a whisper, and puddles reflected the streetlamps. She opened her history file and smiled. The project could wait until morning. Tonight, she understood that the library was more than shelves and screens. It was a steady candle for the neighborhood, bright when people needed one another.
