Three Views of Dawn

- ① At the harbor festival, Mina carried three drafts about the same dawn. Her first was a haiku: “Fog folds over docks / One bell wakes the quiet boats / Gulls stitch up the sky.” She chose seventeen syllables, arranged 5-7-5, with no rhyme. The brief form held one sharp moment instead of telling a full story. Its images, fog, bell, boats, and gulls, made the harbor seem still and watchful. Readers had to pause and imagine what happened before the bell sounded.
- ② For her second draft, Mina wrote a rhyming quatrain, four lines with an ABAB rhyme pattern: “The market lights began to gleam, / While vendors rolled their carts away; / The tide pulled silver through the stream, / And morning warmed the salted bay.” The repeated end sounds, gleam/stream and away/bay, gave the scene a steady, songlike beat. Unlike the haiku’s quick snapshot, this form moved through several actions. The rhyme connected the lines and made the busy harbor feel orderly, as if dawn followed a familiar path each day.
- ③ Mina’s last draft used free verse. It had no set rhyme scheme: “Behind the fish market, / a child finds a blue button / near a rope dark with rain. / She pockets it, / then runs toward the ferry, / leaving one small circle of color / beside the gray water.” The uneven line lengths slowed readers on details. The pauses made the discovery feel unexpected. Free verse let Mina follow the child’s movement without fitting each thought into a set pattern. The three drafts showed how form shaped attention and mood.

1	How does the haiku's short 5-7-5 structure affect what the reader notices about the harbor?	It creates a brief snapshot of one moment and focuses attention on sharp images, making the harbor seem still and watchful.
2	How does the quatrain's ABAB rhyme pattern affect the style of Mina's second draft?	The repeated end sounds give it a steady, songlike beat and make the busy harbor feel orderly.
3	How do the uneven line lengths and pauses in the free verse affect the reader's experience?	They slow the reader on small details and make the child's discovery feel private and unexpected.
4	Compare the haiku and the rhyming quatrain. How does each form handle action in the harbor scene?	The haiku captures one still moment, while the quatrain moves through several actions, such as vendors leaving, the tide pulling, and morning warming the bay.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)

Cold rain taps windows The street lamps blur in puddles Night holds its wet breath Rain drums a beat along the lane,
Cars hiss and splash beneath the light, The clouds move on, but drops remain, And windows shine against the night.
The haiku captures one quiet instant, so the rain feels still and close. The rhyming quatrain moves through sounds and actions, and its repeated end rhymes create a steadier, more musical style.

Accept answers that connect a form's structure, such as syllable pattern, rhyme, line length, or pauses, to a specific effect on meaning or style. For the open task, accept varied topics and wording if the haiku, rhyme pattern, and two-sentence explanation meet the stated requirements.
