Peregrines in the City

- ① On a spring morning, a peregrine falcon drops from the ledge of a downtown bridge. Its pointed wings fold back as it dives toward a pigeon. Peregrines are among the fastest animals on Earth. During a hunting dive, called a stoop, one may reach more than 200 miles per hour. The bird strikes with its feet and then carries its prey to a safe perch. City buildings can provide the high nesting spots that cliffs offer in the wild.
- ② Yet city life creates dangers for these birds. Glass windows can reflect the sky, making them hard for a flying falcon to see. Busy roads and construction can disturb nests. In the past, some pesticides also harmed peregrines by making their eggshells too thin. Conservation groups helped populations recover after certain harmful pesticides were banned or restricted. Today, biologists often place nesting boxes on tall structures and watch the birds from a distance so they do not disturb the young.
- ③ A nest box is not simply a wooden shelter. It gives falcons a flat, gravel-covered space that resembles a natural cliff ledge. Adults usually lay eggs in early spring, and both parents help keep them warm. After the chicks hatch, the adults bring food to the nest. People watching a nest camera can learn when chicks grow feathers and begin practicing short flights. However, viewers should not approach an active nest. Close visits may cause the adults to leave temporarily, exposing eggs or chicks to weather or predators.

Conservation efforts and nest boxes have supported the birds. Adults care for chicks, but people should observe nests from far away to keep the young safe.
