CORRECT SENTENCE

A correctly punctuated sentence does not use only a comma to join two complete thoughts. It may use a period, a semicolon, or a comma plus a coordinating conjunction when needed.

At sunrise, the gardener watered the roses.

COMMA SPLICE

A comma splice happens when a writer uses only a comma to join two complete sentences. The comma needs help from a coordinating conjunction, a semicolon, or a period.

The train arrived late, passengers missed the connection.
