Peregrines Above the Streets

- ① Many cities now host peregrine falcons, birds once endangered in much of the United States because of DDT, a pesticide that weakened eggshells. After DDT was banned in 1972 and protection efforts expanded, populations recovered. Tall buildings offer ledges that resemble the cliffs where peregrines naturally nest. From these high places, the birds can spot pigeons and other prey. A peregrine can dive at more than 200 miles per hour, making it one of the fastest animals on Earth.
- ② City nesting is not always simple. Glass walls can confuse birds, and busy streets create noise below the nest. Some building managers work with wildlife groups to place nest boxes on safe rooftops and to report nest locations to researchers. Researchers may attach small bands to chicks so they can learn where young falcons travel after leaving the nest. These efforts help scientists track the population without approaching nests too often, which could disturb the adult birds.
- ③ Residents can support the birds without treating them as pets. People can watch from a distance, keep dogs away from areas beneath active nests, and avoid feeding pigeons near nesting sites. Feeding pigeons may increase the number of prey animals, but it can also draw crowds and change the falcons' hunting area. During nesting season, some communities share viewing updates online so people can observe responsibly. A city can be valuable habitat when people make room for wildlife and respect its needs.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)

After pesticide restrictions and conservation work, peregrine falcons began using tall city buildings as nest sites. Urban life brings dangers such as confusing glass, so managers and scientists monitor nests carefully. Residents can help by giving the birds space, controlling dogs near nests, and not feeding pigeons.
