Why Cities Hold Heat

- ① On a hot afternoon, a city block can feel much warmer than a nearby park. This difference is called an urban heat island. Dark roofs, asphalt streets, and crowded buildings absorb sunlight, then release heat slowly. Trees and soil, however, provide shade and cool the air as water evaporates from leaves. The contrast is not just uncomfortable. Higher temperatures can increase energy use, worsen air pollution, and place stress on people who work or exercise outdoors.
- ② City planners can mitigate this effect by changing the surfaces people see every day. A reflective roof sends more solar energy back into the atmosphere than a black roof does. Permeable pavement allows rainwater to enter the ground instead of rushing into drains, and the stored water can later evaporate. Planting trees is also an effective strategy, especially in neighborhoods with little shade. These measures do not eliminate summer heat, but they can reduce its intensity and improve public health.
- ③ In Phoenix, Arizona, city crews have tested lighter-colored pavement on neighborhood streets. Researchers studying heat-reduction projects measure surface temperature, air temperature, and how people use outdoor spaces. Their evidence helps leaders evaluate which designs offer the greatest benefit. The issue also involves equity. Neighborhoods with fewer trees often experience more intense heat, yet residents may have fewer resources for cooling. Careful planning can distribute protections where they are most needed and make a city more resilient during heat waves.
