Why Cities Stay Hot

- ① On a hot July afternoon, pavement in many cities can reach temperatures far above the air. Dark roofs and roads absorb sunlight instead of reflecting it. Later, they radiate that stored heat back into the neighborhood. This effect, called an urban heat island, makes evenings feel relentless, or unending. Trees, parks, and light-colored roofs can lower surface temperatures by providing shade and reflecting more sunlight. They also make sidewalks more comfortable for people walking home safely.
- ② City planners study heat maps to find blocks where residents face the greatest risk. A neighborhood with few trees may offer little refuge, meaning little protection from heat. In those places, officials may plant trees near bus stops, paint roofs white, or replace some asphalt with cooler materials. These steps can mitigate the problem, or make its harmful effects less severe. They are especially useful for older adults and young children who may struggle during high temperatures.
- ③ Not every solution costs the same amount. Creating a small shaded plaza may be cheaper than rebuilding an entire street, but both can help. When people have cooler places to wait, walk, and gather, a neighborhood becomes more livable. The goal is not to eliminate summer heat, but to reduce its burden on people and energy systems. By combining several strategies, cities can make heat waves less dangerous and protect public health during long hot spells.

3	What does refuge mean in paragraph 2?	Refuge means a place or source of protection from heat. The paragraph explains it as "little protection from heat."
4	What does mitigate mean in paragraph 2?	Mitigate means reduce or make less severe. The paragraph says the steps make harmful effects less severe.
