The Library Seed Exchange

- ① On Saturday mornings, the Eastview Library's lobby smells faintly of soil. Near the entrance, a wooden cabinet holds packets of basil, beans, and marigold seeds. The cabinet is part of the library's seed exchange, a project that lets neighbors borrow seeds, grow plants, and return new seeds after harvest. Librarian Mara Ortiz says the exchange began with a simple goal: make gardening possible for people who lack a yard or money for starter plants. By spring, the cabinet had become a meeting place for experienced gardeners and curious beginners.
- ② The project works because its rules are clear. First, visitors may take only what they can plant; this limit prevents a few people from emptying the cabinet. Gardeners do not have to return the same kind of seed. Instead, they save dry seeds from healthy plants and label each packet with the plant's name, variety, and harvest year. The labels matter; without them, the next gardener cannot tell whether a packet contains spicy peppers or mild ones. As a result, the exchange builds a collection suited to local conditions.
- ③ At the June swap, Ortiz shared advice for first-time growers: start with one small container, place it where it receives enough light, and water the soil when it feels dry. She also warned visitors not to collect seeds from every plant. Some hybrids will not produce plants like their parents, so gardeners should consult a reliable seed guide before saving them. The library plans to add workshops on composting and pollinator gardens next year; however, Ortiz hopes the cabinet remains the project's center. "Seeds give people a reason to share knowledge," she explained.
