Restoring a Prairie Shoreline

- ① On a windy Saturday, volunteers gathered at Chicago's Burnham Wildlife Corridor, a narrow stretch of native habitat beside Lake Michigan. Their task was not to plant a manicured garden, but to restore a prairie, an ecosystem once common in the region. The ground looked sparse after winter, yet hidden seeds and deep roots remained alive beneath the soil. Ecologist Maya Thompson explained that native grasses can be resilient, or able to recover after drought, fire, and seasonal change. Restoring them helps insects, birds, and people share a healthier shoreline.
- ② Before work began, Thompson asked students to notice the difference between weeds and invasive plants. A weed is simply a plant growing where someone does not want it, she said. An invasive plant is a nonnative species that spreads quickly and can displace native organisms. The distinction mattered when the group removed garlic mustard. If its seeds were allowed to disperse, or scatter widely, the plant could claim more space each year. Volunteers cut the stems before the plants formed seed pods, then carried the pieces away rather than leaving them in a pile.
- ③ At the end of the day, the corridor did not look dramatic. Small patches of bare earth showed where garlic mustard had grown, and young prairie plants were easy to miss. Still, Thompson called the work a long-term investment. Prairie roots can extend several feet underground, helping soil absorb water during storms. As the native plants mature, they will provide pollen and shelter for wildlife. Thompson said the volunteers were building a legacy, meaning something valuable passed on to future people. Their effort would not transform the shoreline overnight, but it could change what thrives there for decades.

1	What does sparse mean as it describes the ground in paragraph 1? Which nearby detail helps you infer that meaning?	Sparse means thinly covered or having few plants. The detail that seeds and roots were hidden beneath the soil suggests that little was visible above ground.
2	How is an invasive plant different from a weed, according to paragraph 2?	A weed is any plant growing where it is unwanted. An invasive plant is a nonnative species that spreads quickly and can displace native organisms.
3	What does disperse mean in paragraph 2? What words in the sentence directly support your answer?	Disperse means scatter or spread widely. The words “or scatter widely” directly support the meaning.
4	What does legacy mean in paragraph 3? How does the word valuable affect the meaning of legacy in this passage?	Legacy means something passed on to future people. The word valuable gives legacy a positive meaning.
